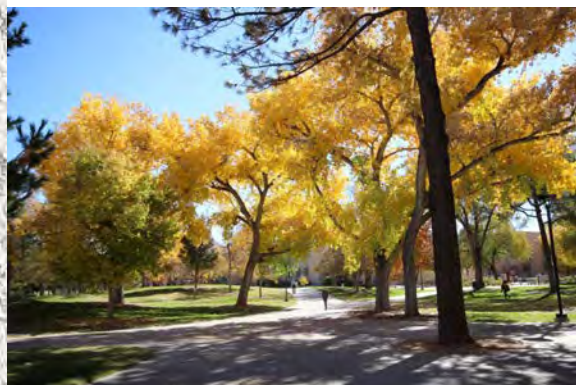

Fellowship Policy Update

The College has updated its guidelines for faculty pursuing external fellowships.

If you're planning to apply, [please review the full policy](#), but here are the two big takeaways:

- ✓ Talk with your chair before applying.
Fellowships affect teaching schedules and workload planning, so early conversation with your unit is now required.
- ✓ Fellowships must be spaced out.

Faculty should have two years of regular duties between fellowships, and they generally cannot be taken directly before or after a sabbatical

GRO Funding Success

We're excited to share that two A&S proposals received new GRO funding this cycle:

- "At Risk to At Promise" (Marlene Sanchez) will expand early support for first-year students through a peer ambassador program and enhance academic probation processes to improve third-semester retention.
- "Reflect, Connect, Retain," a collaboration between CTL and A&S, will foster instructor community and reflective practice centered on student success.

Student Well-Being Survey Results

UNM's latest well-being survey shows overall scores consistent with national peers, but highlights lower wellbeing among students with disabilities, transgender/gender-nonconforming students, and queer-spectrum students. Parenting students reported the strongest well-being indicators, while 35% of all students worry often or very often about paying for educational expenses.

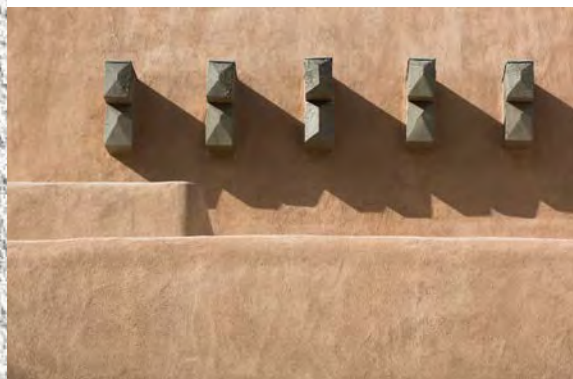

Dr. Daphne Littlebear (Santa Ana Pueblo, Yuchi, Mvskoke, Shawnee), Assistant Professor of Native American Studies, presented "Relational Pathways: Indigenizing Evaluation in Pueblo Pedagogies" at the inaugural Indigenous Evaluators Network Symposium at Laguna Pueblo. Her work examines evaluation grounded in Pueblo values, governance, and relational accountability.

Kate Cartwright completed her term as Chair of the Health Administration Section of the American Public Health Association at its 2025 Annual Meeting in Washington, D.C. Elizabeth Pérez-Chiqués (Visiting Assistant Professor, SPA) delivered an invited presentation at the Building a Public Administration for a New Era Forum at the Chamber of Deputies of Mexico. She also received SEHCITI funding for research on institutional capacities for ethical and effective AI implementation in Mexico's health and justice sectors.

Diné Language & Wellbeing PhotoVoice Study

Tiffany S. Lee (Distinguished Professor, NAS), Wendy S. Greyeyes (Associate Professor, NAS), Melvatha Chee (Associate Professor, Linguistics), Chenoa Bah Stilwell-Jensen (College of Health Sciences), and James McKenzie are leading a community-engaged study on how exposure to Diné Bizaad supports Diné youth wellbeing. The team is partnering with five educational organizations and using PhotoVoice, interviews, and Diné-based protocols grounded in *k'é* to explore language and identity from early childhood through young adulthood.

Professor Rosa Vallejos-Yopán (Linguistics) has published a new paper examining coreference relations in complex clauses in Kukama-Kukamiria, contributing to broader understanding of Amazonian Indigenous languages. The chapter appears in the University of Sonora's new open-access volume *Relaciones simétricas y asimétricas*.
