
Dear Arts & Sciences community,



FACULTY NEWS

Faculty and Students Partner with District 6 on Participatory Budgeting and Food Justice

Professors Jennifer Tucker (Community and Regional Planning) and Andreas Hernandez (Sustainability Studies) partnered with Albuquerque's District 6 to design a participatory budgeting pilot that gave residents direct say in allocating \$1.5 million in city funds. The student-designed process identified healthy food access as the top priority, leading to a Growers' Market that broke ground in July 2025. To date, approximately \$4 million has been mobilized toward resident priorities. Hernandez and graduate student Esther Hewitt have since formed a Participatory Action Research working group through UNM's NSF-funded Transformation Network, establishing a District 6 Food Policy Council and supporting legislative efforts to expand neighborhood food access.

Dixon Awarded Fulbright for Research and Teaching in Paris

Emeritus Professor E. James Dixon (Anthropology) has received a Fulbright award to teach and conduct research at the University of Paris in Fall 2025. While in residence at the Sorbonne, he will lecture on North American archaeology and collaborate with Dr. Claire Alix on the analysis of rare wooden artifacts recovered from melting Alaskan glaciers. He will also give a public talk, "How, When, and Why People First Came to the Americas," at the Société des Amériques at the Musée du Quai Branly-Jacques Chirac.

Jessica Goodkind Publishes Two Articles in *Social Science & Medicine*

Professor Jessica Goodkind (Sociology & Criminology) and colleagues recently published two articles in *Social Science & Medicine*. The first, co-authored with several graduate students, examines the [emotional and bodily dimensions of intersectional capitalism among Latinx immigrants in the United States](#). The second, written with Ifrah Magan, explores the [mental and physical health consequences of the U.S. citizenship exam for Rohingya refugees](#).

Language Learning Center Hosts Inaugural Festival of Languages

On November 7th, the Language Learning Center hosted the inaugural Festival of Languages. This event had over 200 attendees and featured connections between languages and research, culture, and careers from student, faculty, and community members. Sessions included hands-on cultural workshops like making dumplings, career presentations, and research on Indigenous Signed Languages.

León-Moreta Presents Affordable Housing Research at APPAM Annual Meeting

Associate Professor Dr. Agustín León-Moreta (School of Public Administration) presented research on affordable housing-, "Funding the Mandate: The Relationship Between Inclusionary Requirements and Local Commitments for Affordable Housing," at the 2025 Association for Public Policy Analysis and Management (APPAM) Annual Meeting in Seattle, Washington.

Wood Has Two Forthcoming Books in 2026

Professor Emeritus Rich Wood (Sociology & Criminology) has two books forthcoming in 2026: *Bridging Social Divides: Increasing Social Cohesion in a Fragmented Society* will be published by Oxford University Press and *The Common Good in the Age of Artificial Intelligence* for Bloomsbury Academic, which Wood co-edited.
